

Fighting for a Greener Platt Park

In early April, my wife and I attended a public online meeting regarding the East Louisiana / South Pearl Street storm sewer improvement project. A project providing a much-needed upgrade to how our stormwater is captured and diverted in attempts to limit flooding, which has been a problem in the area for years.

We joined the meeting as most construction projects and traffic diversion in this area directly impacts my family and neighbors on the 1200 block of South Pennsylvania, this project included. When our traffic related anxieties subsided after the DOTI (Dept. of Transportation and Infrastructure) project manager fielded our first questions, we shifted excitedly to questions about what to expect at the northern — and most visible — gateway to the heart of the Platt Park neighborhood; our vibrant collection of businesses and restaurants. This intersection is currently about as welcoming as the top-deck of a downtown parking garage on a July afternoon, directly contrasting with the picturesque haven of South Pearl Street. Needless to say, this intersection desperately needs a facelift. Trees and vegetation would go a long way. The DOTI representative braced us, "You're not going to like my answer."

Concrete. Concrete. Concrete. Nary a tree (existing or new) planned for the intersection from alley-to-alley along Louisiana. More of the same, extending similar distances north and south along Pearl Street. This baffled me. Perhaps the red flags would not have flown if I were not married to a talented landscape architect and self-described "tree nerd" who co-penned the very guidelines for the Denver Forester's Greener Denver initiative. Mind you, the Denver Forester always gets their way when new construction occurs. In fairness, the design confused even the DOTI project manager who graciously helped amend the design to save the existing viable (3) trees. But this was not good enough; we still needed more trees.

While we appreciate the consideration of future protected bike lanes, trees bring immeasurable value to our community—especially when the Denver Metro area has ranked sixth in the nation for the worst air pollution. Trees are our neighborhood's greatest asset to mitigate Denver's increasing heat island effect and help lower carbon emissions. Trees have also been statistically proven to reduce crime, increase retail visitation time, and increase property values; and in case you haven't noticed, many of the trees that make up our beautiful canopy are ailing.

With a projected project start date of June 2023, time was of the essence. With the help of City Councilman Jolon Clark, we worked with DOTI and the Denver Forester to determine how we arrived at all this concrete. As it turned out, plans for a protected bike lane along Louisiana interfered with stormwater-fed tree planters.

By now you've probably noticed the "Grand Opening" banner over **Ototo Den** at 1501 S Pearl. If you're like me you are thinking, didn't there used to be Ototo Den here and so shouldn't it be "Grand Re-Opening" but perhaps I'm bogging down in the semantics. Either way it is good to see one of the last remaining Covid casualties open once again. To re-open Toshi Kizake, owner along with his brother Yasu of the Den empire, traveled to Japan to



hand-select Japanese chefs to run the kitchen of Ototo Den illustrating the brother's commitment to authenticity.

So, what exactly is the difference between Ototo Den and the other Dens? Is this just baby-den or something (Ototo does mean "little brother" in Japanese)? There is some menu overlap as there are in the other Dens but you won't find a sushi menu or elaborate catch of the day items. The heart of the menu centers around tapas sized offerings of various delicacies like pan-fried mochi wrapped in crispy bacon; Tako Yaki, or fried wheat balls stuffed with octopus; and Buta Kimchi, a Canadian Mugi-Buta pork wok-seared with spicy Korean kimchi. If none of that makes any culinary sense then just roll on over between 4:30 and 10 pm any day but Monday and Tuesday. You won't be disappointed. Welcome back little brother!

The owners of La Chiva Colombian Restaurant at 1446 S Broadway have opened a fun new café across the street in their old location called **LaTinto Café** located at 1417 S Broadway. I dropped in the other day inadvertently right at their closing time, 2:00 pm, but no matter, the super warm staff was more than happy to extend closing for a little bit just to entertain me. Thanks! The heart of everything here is in the Colombian roots of the ownership and staff. All the coffee served comes directly from specialty independent farms in Columbia who harvest in small batches which are then roasted locally. The coffee was excellent I might add.

The café serves all sorts of breakfast offerings as well as a fun array of pastries and breads. The staff told me that all the recipes come from their grandmothers as they relayed stories of visiting grandma and always being filled with delectable delights. I tried the Patel Gloria which was a

Broadway continues to become more and more of an international food court and LaTinto is a great new addition.



Non-watered trees were a non-starter. As the Platt Park People's Association (3PA) dovetailed in, we brought in the South Pearl Street Association, which represents businesses we know and love along Pearl Street. We all understood that water and care for any trees was the linchpin for our plan and the South Pearl Street Association stepped up in a big way helping secure a watering solution for new trees as part of this construction project.

The outcome? We are getting more trees! A very big, heartfelt thank you goes out to the South Pearl Street Association for committing to the care and watering of an additional (5) trees at the intersection!

I can hear it now, "That's awesome! Now...what about the derelict Hanson's building and the 7-Eleven building?" While we still are not certain about the future of the old Hanson's at the southwest corner, the 7-Eleven building on the northwest corner (and more than half the block northward) is planned for a large development starting late 2023 bringing a radical facelift to the northmost block of South Pearl Street. Getting the Lead Out A Water Safety Update for Platt Park

A few years ago some of you in the neighborhood might have remembered when Denver Water notified us about a Lead Reduction Program that would affect not only our little slice of Denver, but the whole City. As a part of this program, we also all got our very own Brita® pitchers and filters to be used until our lines were deemed safe from lead.

Recently, I noticed Denver Water doing work on Clarkson Street and replacing water lines to the homes adjacent to the street. As such I thought perhaps it was our turn to get our lines replaced. Well - we are not quite on the schedule yet to "get the lead out." But, I was able to get the update from Denver Water which we have shared with you below. At this time it sounds like we just need to be patient and continue using our filters.

"Denver Water recently replaced an underground water pipeline on South Clarkson Street in Platt Park. During that work, Denver Water crews replaced any customer-owned lead services lines, which connect from the water pipeline to individual properties, as they were identified.

This main replacement project is separate from Denver Water's Lead Reduction Program. Platt Park residents who have a suspected lead service line but do not live along South Clarkson Street in the completed pipeline project area are still in the Lead Reduction Program, and, if a lead service line is confirmed, will have their line replaced by Denver Water at no expense to the customer.

In the next few months, Denver Water's contractor is expected to be in the Platt Park neighborhood to conduct investigative potholing, which will help determine how many lead service lines need to be replaced. That said, Denver Water does not yet have an anticipated start date for Platt Park lead service line replacement work to begin. Denver Water identifies work areas by the fall of each year for the following year.

Several factors drive when and where service lines are replaced. Denver Water prioritizes communities who are most vulnerable and at-risk from lead exposure, particularly infants and children. Areas with large numbers of facilities that serve these populations, such as schools and daycares, are also prioritized.

Once work areas are identified, Denver Water will determine the timing for individual properties in that work area. Once a property has been identified for a service line replacement, Denver Water will send additional information about the replacement process and next steps. This notification typically comes a month or two before the anticipated replacement date.

Dandelions: The Spring Weed Invasion

The grass is greening, and the days are warming. As responsible neighbors, we want to maintain our property, including culling the weeds. But, did you know that some weeds can be beneficial?

Did you know:

- 1. Dandelions bring nutrients to surrounding trees via their deep roots, which helps make for healthier trees.
- 2. Dandelions are the first food source for bees and butterflies, helping to preserve the pollinators, which in turn helps our gardens grow more abundantly.
- 3. Dandelions are safe for kids and pets. You can even pay to buy dandelion greens at Whole Foods! These dark green leafy veggies contain vitamins A, C, K, and E, plus folate, iron, calcium, magnesium, and potassium. Dandelion greens are a powerhouse of nutrients in a salad, smoothie, or stir-fry.

I love dandelions and even have a large dandelion print framed in my living room! They bring color to mountainsides, parks, and lawns. However, not everyone is in love with the hardy dandelion.

To prevent dandelions from finally realizing their dream of world domination, try these healthy and compassionate options:

- 1. Use a stand-up <u>weed zinger</u> for popping them out without bending over. Have an elderly neighbor? Burn a few extra calories and pop their weeds out while singing, "It's a beautiful day in the neighborhood..."
- 2. Use a small, <u>hand-held weed popper</u> while getting your hands dirty and sitting close to the earth to increase feelings of well-being.
- 3. Mow your lawn before the dandelions go to seed.
- 4. Over seeds with grass seed to create a dense lawn that prevents dandelions from growing.
- 5. Create a yard of wildflowers, vegetables, or xeric plants, and use a mulch to cover the dirt between plants.
- 6. Pull dandelions early for less work later.
- 7. Hire a lawn service, neighbor kids, or someone from Nextdoor to pull them for you.
- 8. Go urban foraging (where you know the dogs don't roam and spray or weed and feed hasn't been used) and snap off those yellow flower heads into your basket (before they go to seed). Go online to look up your favorite way to use them in tea, wine, battered and fried, jellied, pickled, and more! Note: Skip consuming dandelions if you have allergies to them.

9. Check out: "10 Non-Toxic Natural Ways to Kill Weeds."

All weeds — not treated with chemicals — can go directly into your green city compost bin! Hooray!

Remember, all the chemicals we spray directly on weeds or apply as "weed and feed" to kill the weeds also kill our pollinators, pollute our drinking water and air, and negatively affect our health.

If you are a chemical-free property, reach out to our neighbor Joyce at joyce@peopleandpollinators.org with People & Pollinators to receive a sign for your yard for a donation of \$10. It's a friendly reminder for us as we walk the neighborhood that pollinators are important and that we care about each other.
